These Are Our Stories: Lent in a Pandemic Year

Hosted by St David's Church Exeter on Tuesday afternoons 2pm on Zoom 23rd February to 23rd March

Clewer Initiative Lent Group - Women in the shadows

Hosted by Belinda Speed-Andrews on Tuesday evenings from 23rd February.

Worldwide women and girls account for 71% of the 40.3 million people living in modern slavery. In the UK it is harder to gather exact numbers, but we know that in 2018 a third of cases reported to the UK modern slavery helpline related to female victims. To help shine a light on the suffering of marginalised women the Clewer Initiative has launched Women in the Shadows, a new lent course for churches community groups and individuals.

Women in the shadows is a new five-week course for lent focusing on the different ways women and girls are exploited in the UK today. During the course you will discover how women are drawn into modern slavery and exploitative situations and what life can be like for them once they are rescued from exploitation including the many challenges they face as they recover from trauma. You will also find out more about sexual exploitation Labour exploitation and County lines and how to recognise signs of modern slavery. The course is predominantly about women but I would encourage men to join as this is a problem for all of us, men and women. I do hope you feel you are able to join us for this online course this Lent.

The course consists of five short films and a devotional booklet. The films include haunting survivor stories with insightful contributions from frontline experts and campaigners.

The devotional booklet was written by colleagues in the Clewer network who are all deeply committed to combating modern slavery in their dioceses. Through

Bible study reflections and prayer we will explore what the Bible says about social injustice, exploitation, and God's heart for the poor. The devotional booklet will also encourage you to reflect on how we can take action to help vulnerable women in our communities.

Order of Service for the Sunday before Lent, 14 February 2021

Welcome to worship in the parish of St David and St Michael, Exeter on this Second Sunday before Lent.

When his disciples saw Jesus transfigured on the mountain and standing with Moses and Elijah, their eyes were opened. This wasn't just the itinerant preacher from Nazareth that most people saw, but a person who had a unique place in God's purposes. We are challenged by the account of Jesus' transfiguration to look at how we see the world. Can we see at least some of the possibilities that God sees for ourselves and for those around us. Are we willing to be changed into the likeness of the Christ who loves without limit?

Opening Prayer

Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prayers of Penitence

When Christ appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is.

So let us confess our sins that mar his image in us.

Your unfailing kindness, O Lord, is in the heavens, And your faithfulness reaches to the clouds: Lord have mercy, Lord, have mercy.

Your righteousness is like the strong mountains, And your justice as the great deep: Christ, have mercy. Christ have mercy

For with you is the well of life: And in your light shall we see light: Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy.

The priest pronounces the absolution.

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Collect

Almighty Father, whose Son was revealed in majesty before he suffered death on the cross: give us grace to perceive his glory, that we may be strengthened to suffer with him and changed into his likeness, from glory to glory; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

First Reading – 2 Kings 2: 1-12

Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, 'Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel.' But Elisha said, 'As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.' So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, 'Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?' And he said, 'Yes, I know; keep silent.'

Elijah said to him, 'Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho.' But he said, 'As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.' So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, 'Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?' And he answered, 'Yes, I know; be silent.'

Then Elijah said to him, 'Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan.' But he said, 'As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.' So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, 'Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you.' Elisha said, 'Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit.' He responded, 'You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not.' As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, 'Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!' But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

Gospel Reading – Mark 9: 2-9

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and

his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!' Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Address by Howard Friend for the Sunday before Lent

Mention 'Chariots of Fire' and most of us will think of that Film. The Vangelis sound track and the runners striding out along the sea shore.

(By the way – hope you enjoyed the clip. We had fun filming it – on our allotment. Incredibly we only had one take!)

Those heroic young men: Harold Abrahams fighting Oxbridge anti-Semitism. Eric Liddle, the Christian Missionary who wouldn't compete on Sundays - both winning Olympic golds against all the odds. Stirring stuff. I've always liked Eric Liddle's description of his sport: Do you remember that bit? 'God made me fast, and when I run I feel his pleasure'. Unlike most of us who when we run - feel out of breath!

The Film title, I understand, was taken from the Blake poem which with Parry's music and Elgar's orchestration is commonly known as Jerusalem:

Bring me my bow....

Bring my arrows...

Bring me my Chariot of Fire

Which in turn comes straight from the second book of Kings

- our scripture reading today.

This is a story not of individual Golds – but rather a sort of relay race with the emphasis on handing over the baton.

Great drama: Elijah disappearing into the clouds in his Chariot of Fire witnessed by his protege Elisha, who thereby qualifies for a double portion of his Spirit. And immediately proves his worth by parting the waters of the Jordon with the cloak just as Elijah had done before. (That bit immediately follows where our reading left off.)

I'm tempted to call it : A Steep Yearning Curve!'

But on a serious note. This extraordinary story of 'The Light Fantastic' has made me think about how we pass on to the next generation what we know about God – or what we presume to know of him. I'm going to use the word mentoring to

describe this one to one transmission (And we're not talking viruses here – for a change)

Mentoring - It's been on my mind a lot recently. (And I realise that the modern use of the word often implies a less didactic and more 'getting alongside' role for the mentor) than is implied in this story - which in a way suits my point.

Did you notice how Elijah was trying to get rid of Elisha as he did his valedictory tour. I'm going to Bethel Elisha -you stay here. Nope - I'm coming with you. And so on several more times.

Elijah had probably been mentoring Elisha for some considerable time – and he just wanted a break. I well remember that feeling with Medical Students, who I enjoyed having with me for the most part. But sometimes, perhaps at the end of a busy week, just wanting them - out of there -with their constant questioning - so I could just finish the job and get home.

And here's the point. Most of the success of being a Mentor is in just allowing the person to be there with you, and to give them time, discuss things with them.Be available to them. They will learn from you as you go about your business: The good - and the not so good.

Elisha learned that God's spirit is what a Prophet needs – and a double portion at that. Job done! The baton is handed over – or in this case the cloak. In our Gospel reading – I suggest that Jesus was doing a similar thing with his disciples. (Except the R number is 3 – and later on 12 – if you get my meaning - those of you who are preoccupied with your breakfast or the cricket – rewind and work it out)

Jesus allowed a select trio to be with him - in this case up a mountain - for this extraordinary Transfiguration experience.

What's going on here? Well I'm not sure I know the complete answer to that - but here's my take. I think the Gospel writer wants to emphasise the authority and continuity of the Divine presence - in Jesus. The Old Covenant heavyweights are there: Moses the lawgiver, Elijah the Prophet – in conversation with Jesus we assume - giving advice maybe? And then for the second time we hear the celestial words of affirmation first heard at Jesus's Baptism. This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him Proof positive to the disciples then that this Jesus, whom they

are following, is authentic, is the real deal. And - blinding them with light. So then – what does this all mean for us.

Elijah mentored Elisha – took Elisha along with him,taught him all he knew – made sure he saw The Chariot of Fire and had a double portion of his Spirit. Jesus took his disciples along with him on a journey of spiritual discovery – made sure they saw the full glory of his transfigured self – which was preparation, I'm sure, for the time when he showed them his crucified self. Helped them understand the mystery of his resurrected self.

Today's Epistle – 2 Corinthians talks, helpfully I think about all believers being indwelt by the Light of Christ – chapter 2 v 4 'God has made his light shine in our hearts.'

You might reasonably say at this point:

Well – just at the moment - I can barely keep my flame alight – let alone pass it on to others. Life has been hard recently. Yes - this past year has been hard going for a lot of us.

Chariots of Fire / Dazzling Transfigurations just don't cut it. Many of us can't handle that sort of imagery at present.

And do you know -I think a flickering candle-light type faith right now is more authentic – certainly more realistic.

So if the light God is shining in your heart is like that –it's OK - don't worry. And - don't be afraid to pass on to others that - this is how it is. There are many in our families, amongst our friends and neighbours who are struggling too – with no light at all to guide them. We would do well get alongside them and start a conversation.

It's quite likely many of you are already doing just this without making a fuss about it: with your children and grandchildren and in other ways.

Remember this is not a Race for individual Gold – but rather a relay where we hand the baton on.

Closing Prayer and Blessing

Assist us, gracious Lord, as we listen to the voice of your Son; that as we now meet him under a veil, so we may come to the vision of his glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The peace of God which passes all understanding Keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, And of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit be upon us and remain with us always. Amen.
